

A truly wicked performance!

It is no small thing to undertake putting on something as well known as the Wizard of Oz, all the more daunting when your cast consists of nearly 50 under twelves. But, of course, this was Westbury-on-Severn C of E primary school, and we have come to expect a jubilant, spirited, uplifting and confident performance, and the eager audience was not disappointed.

From the tornado which whisks our heroine off to the land of the Munchkins, through the journey along the yellow brick road to the Emerald City, via encounters with witches from East and West, this production zinged along, held tightly together by the principals, Eden Young as the Scarecrow, Viki Simonidou as Tin Man, Bella Lloyd, the

Lion, and with a stunning performance from Amelie Phillips as Dorothy. Each year the performance bar seems set a little higher by the children and staff of this small village school, in the acting, the singing to a backing track and choreography. There is such strength in depth, and the children always seem to be enjoying themselves, with not a hint of hesitancy or self-consciousness. This is, of course a result of many weeks of hard work by both cast and teachers, and confidence seems always to peak at performance time. As headmaster, Mr. Crunkhurn must be credited with establishing the ethos that gives rise to these productions, helped by the staff, Mrs Roseblade-Bargh, Mrs Sim and Mrs McCartney and other staff members who

Parish Council

We were a couple of councillors short at the July Parish Council meeting and Brian Robinson, our County Councillor, had also sent his apologies. He had, however, e-mailed us his report. The County Council has committed to zero carbon emissions by 2050 and a draft strategy for this is currently being considered. A youth climate panel is going to be set up and solar panels on Shire Hall and LCD street lighting have already reduced the County Councils carbon emissions by 52% since 2008. The Javelin incinerator is now being tested prior to going into operation later this year, £150m is being spent on the County's roads, and GigaClear are laying the fibre cables which

will be bringing superfast connections to the area. As far as the District Council is concerned, he reports that future Council funding will be "challenging" and that plans for the development of the Five Acres college site as leisure facilities has hit a setback.

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Planning

There were no objections to an application for the erection of a single storey extension & car port at Higher Ground, Northwood Green, and after Chairman Simon had left the room having declared an interest in the application for the erection of an agricultural building at Wintles Farm, Northwood Green, the rest of us agreed to support the application. Fiona then updated us on the results of several recent planning applications.



District Council acts on climate emergency

The council is keen to 'get its own house in order' by reducing its carbon footprint as an example for others. Last month a carbon reduction coordinator was appointed and is now assessing the current greenhouse gas emissions of the council, developing a community engagement plan, researching opportunities for energy saving measures and renewable energy installations, along with increasing the green electricity supply to council buildings. Additionally, a Support Group is being set up to assist in the development of a longer term strategy and every policy, report and decision made will consider the carbon reduction implications.


Westbury 2nd XI bt Whitminster XI by 54 runs.

Around the Parish

Recent checks and jobs done on the play area indicate that it no longer needs the big clean up that we had planned. A request for some play equipment to be installed at Northwood Green playing field is being considered by the Parochial Church Council.

Highways

Lots of problems have been reported and there is a general feeling that the lanes are in a worse state than they were a year ago. The issues include a blocked drain under the railway bridge at Jordans Hill, needles found in the pumping station in Ampney Lane, which also seems to have been used as a toilet, and the van advertising Woolaston Car Boot sales, which seems to be routinely parked on the grass verge on the A48. Also the hedge alongside the pavement on the A48 needs cutting. However, there had also been some improvements, including an advance warning sign about the low bridge in Blaisdon Road.

Footpaths

Mike Townsend and Jeff Wheeler, the Public Rights of Way Inspector, have been busy sorting out lots of the local footpaths. Four that had been blocked are now clear, a couple are just waiting for new stiles to be put in and work is in progress on a couple more. However, there is no end to the work involved and an unsafe bridge, a blocked stile and all manner of difficulties encountered walking along the river bank in Rodley were added to the list at the meeting. Although not in our parish, it was reported that a fence had been put up across the path linking Welshbury



Wood with Chestnuts Wood. As this path has probably been trodden continuously since the Iron Age, it was felt that we should add our voice to complaints that it has been blocked.

Burial Ground Extension

Just to update everyone on what has been a controversial subject - the planning application for the change of use of land to provide an extension to the burial ground and a replacement playing field for the school was presented to the Planning Committee on 11th June, with an officer recommendation of approval. At that meeting, members resolved to grant planning permission but, as a result of the objection from Sport England, the application had to be referred to the Secretary of State for consideration before the planning permission could be formally issued. We have now heard that the Secretary of State has decided not to "call in" i.e. stop this application.

As expected, there are several conditions to the permission, namely that work on extending the burial ground cannot start until "the new playing field facilities have been completed, laid out and made ready for use by the school and thereafter maintained for such purposes in perpetuity." There has to be a schedule of playing field maintenance and independent monitoring approved by the Planning Authority in consultation with Sport England, a fully implemented drainage scheme, and details of the boundary fencing, paths and surfacing between the playing field and the school also have to be approved by the Planning Authority.

So there is much to be done and the school holidays are upon us, but we are still hoping that we can get together with the school governors and get

started. As mentioned above, a priority is to get estimates for the work needed, but we also need to discuss how much of the new field will be required by the school and, as the whole field is no longer classed as agricultural land, what might be a suitable use for any area not required by the school. The lease has to be discussed with the County Council and all concerned need to look at what grant funding is available to help with the costs. The Parish Council has formed a sub-committee to work on this and we feel that it is really important, now that the planning decision has been made, for us all to join forces as a community to make sure that we end up with the best possible facilities, both for the school and for all our residents, both young and old.

Closed churchyard

Our monthly working parties have continued to be well supported. We have had visitors from other churches that are following the God's Acre programme, which encourages wildflowers and wildlife, but they have all been responsible for much smaller churchyards, and seeing the huge area that we are trying to cope with has made them feel much better! The plan to have some areas of short grass, some of medium and some that is left until the end of the season is only partially successful, and we shall be looking at the plan and discussing this with the grass cutting contractors before next year.


Post Office We have now heard that the District Council has agreed to include the Post Office/Lecture Hall on the List of Assets of Community Value following our nomination. After dis-



cussion it was agreed that we would put in a request to become the preferred bidder, after which there will be a period of 6 months for the community to develop proposals and raise capital to purchase the asset. A Parish Council sub-committee has been formed to do this and they are seeking advice from the group in Newnham who have been successful in saving the George for the benefit of their parish. To save the Post Office will require a huge community effort, so a public meeting is to be held – further details as soon as possible.

Other matters John Henry and I are hoping to arrange a visit to Gatwick House Care Home. Northwood Green Social Hall has now got a defibrillator which is just awaiting electrical connection. Fiona has been asked to arrange another First Aid Course covering resuscitation and the use of a defibrillator, and hopes that this will be in September or October. A letter of thanks had been received from Severn and Wye Smokery for our nomination for a CPRE award. The presentation is to be held in the autumn. Although there is not usually a council meeting in August, this year it is highly likely, but if not the next meeting will be on Monday 16th Sept.



Noting the substantial reserve figure, Mark Brill proposed that this should be reviewed, as holding cash does not, of itself, serve the community.

Cricket

Westbury 2nd XI 175 all out

Poulton 2nd XI 116 all out

Westbury 2nd XI travelled to Poulton, chasing a victory that would put some daylight between them and the relegation zone. Despite the excellent facilities, and exquisite Cotswold backdrop, the teams took to the field playing on a wicket that stretched the definition of “patchy” to its outer limits. Rather strangely, not 10 feet away was an immaculate looking strip that we weren’t playing on - such is the fate of 2nd team cricket.


**Westbury 2nd XI bt Whitminster XI


