



Westbury says 'No'

At a packed meeting at the Parish Hall on 17th February, Parish Council Chairman, Simon Phelps, introduced the chief forward planning officer of the Forest of Dean District Council, Nigel Gibbons, who gave some background to the submission of the plan for a vast housing development, largely in Westbury parish. He explained that a consultation about the Local Plan was held last year and the proposal for the so-called 'eco-village' was submitted by developers Ridge and Partners of Cheltenham in response to this consultation. The concept of the plan is a "sustainable community" of 5000 houses, built on farmland, with its own railway station. Plans of the proposed development were on display at the meeting.

The large audience was invited to ask questions and express opinions and there was no shortage of speakers, who covered numerous problems including the risk to Walmore Common, the existing traffic congestion and the lack of supporting infrastructure.

Storm Dennis had lent support to the speaker who pointed out that the area was prone to flooding, as much of it was under water at the time of the meeting. Simon Phelps asked that all present leave their contact details so that they can be kept informed and concluded the meeting with thanks to Nigel Gibbons for coming and a request for a show of hands, which demonstrated the overwhelming opposition to this proposal.

Parish Council

Following the public meeting, parish councillors adjourned to the lounge for our usual monthly meeting. Brian Robinson, our County Councillor, explained that council tax will be increased this year as extra funds are needed for children's and adult care services. He is now the chairman of the Scrutiny Committee for Health and Wellbeing and so this will be his key interest. Ofsted are now carrying out an update on their previous report on children's services and will be doing a full review in a few months, by which time it is hoped that they will no longer be considered "inadequate".

Andrew Middlecote from Gloucestershire Highways was due to meet Chairman Simon Phelps and Michael Townsend shortly regarding various issues on our local roads. Brian also reminded us that the Local Transport Plan is underway with formal public consultation taking place up to March 26th 2020. Moving on to **planning** matters, there were no objections to an application for two extensions to Glencairn on Wintles Hill and an application for a dwelling for staff accommodation at Severn and Wye Smokery was supported, on the condition that it was only for housing Smokery staff. Further to the public meeting regarding the ecovillage proposal, it was agreed to invite a representative of Ridge and Partners, the property and construction consultants behind the proposal, to another public meeting.

Highways Severn Trent are investigat-

ing problems at Acres Corner in Northwood Green where it is believed that rainwater is getting into the sewers. Work is in progress at Stantway, but we understand that the fountain which periodically erupts from the manhole cover has been in full spate during the recent wet weather.

Footpaths A lot of work has been done on the parish's footpaths over recent months and this may well be due to Mike Townsend's constant pressure on the Public Rights of Way (PROW) team. However, a recent complaint that some stiles do not make it easy for dog walkers has not got very far, as apparently there is no requirement for landowners or the PROW team to make stiles accessible for dogs.

Burial Ground A meeting is now being arranged with the County Council and our solicitor to discuss the new lease and rent of the playing field.

Milestones Councillors have been asked to take photos of these so that we can assess what is needed to preserve them. Any work needed is usually paid for by the parish council.

Correspondence Councillors have been invited to a Climate Action Day at the end of March and Chairman Simon and Peter Radley will be representing Westbury. Rev Steve Taylor had consulted the Parish Council regarding ringing the bells in the Tower at Westbury to celebrate the 75th anniversary of VE day, a suggestion that we fully supported.

We had not heard from Gloucester Autograss regarding the dates of their meetings this year, but Fiona had checked their website and the meetings at Elton Corner will take place on 29th March, 12th April and 24th May. She contacted them and they have since confirmed these dates and will be dis-

tributing flyers soon.

For the second month running, the February meeting of the Parish Hall Management Committee was held on a filthy night, which may, or may not, have contributed to a larger than usual number of apologies for absence. The smaller than usual number of members who were present were therefore doubly nonplussed when they trooped into the hall to find that sufficient tables and chairs to accommodate a Billy Graham rally had been set out. The enthusiasm and optimism of the two members who had preceded those of us who had loitered in the bar, and arranged the seating, was explained by the fact that they thought it was the AGM.

Running through the matters arising from the minutes, Chair Jan D'Ambrogio confirmed that she had been in touch with the company responsible for the heating. She also confirmed that no further progress had been made in negotiations with Water Plus (Severn Trent) over the account confusion. There was

widespread outrage at the incompetence of the Water Plus accounts department.

Treasurer's Report

Sarah Mitten had circulated the accounts ahead of the meeting. She noted that the hall finances were in good shape, adding that we had been the beneficiary of a £2,000 bequest from a parishioner. We had yet to pay for the new fire exits in the hall.

Projects

Jan added the lounge heating to the list of outstanding projects. She explained that the bill for the fire exits had not been paid as we were waiting for the installer to remedy a fault with the opening mechanism. She went on to explain that an extractor fan for the whole kitchen, not a cooker hood fan, would cost about £2,000, and an audio loop for hearing aid wearers would be £847 plus VAT.

Severndipity Club (bar)

The accounts had been circulated ahead of the meeting. Ken Boulton reported on a disappointing month, mainly related to adverse weather conditions interrupting the sports programme, but also, as he put it 'a sign of the times'.

Fundraising

Jan advised that there would be a meeting of the fundraising committee on Tues 3rd March at 8pm at the Hall and welcomed anyone who felt they would like to contribute. Events already planned included a Bucks Fizz Brunch on March 29th, a Karaoke Night on June 6th, a barbeque and band on August 8th and a 'Kebabaret (Burlesque cabaret and kebab) on November 21st. A Salmon Lunch was being planned and of course the Summer Show, which is on Sunday September 6th. There is also to be a fundraiser in aid of the Multiple Sclerosis Society in memory of Anna

Tempest. All these events will be publicised here in the WoSP.

Odds and Ends

Ken Boulton sought to clarify the cause of the foul odours in the gents' loo in the lounge, which he maintained was due to a constriction in the flow of water to the flushing cistern.

The possibility of an 'Honours Board' for Parish Hall Chairmen (and women) was resurrected, and will be discussed at the AGM....which is on March 10th at 7.30pm *Ed*

Church Times

The main church season between Christmas and Easter is called Lent and begins on Ash Wednesday, which falls this year on Feb 26th. The season runs up to Easter Saturday, which is April 12th this year, and reminds us of a time in the early church when candidates were prepared for an Easter baptism. In scripture the season is linked to the testing Jesus experienced in the desert in the early days of his ministry. I can see no reason why we shouldn't use the season ourselves to examine the integrity of our lives before God. To do so would be to follow in the footsteps of the generations before us.

Self-denial and meditation are often seen as important aspects of Lent. We may adopt a pattern of fasting or of doing without some material item. We may embark on a discipline of prayer in a new way. We may look for fresh opportunities to give in support of those in need. Whatever path we take through Lent, the heart of the matter has to be a desire to approach more closely to God. There is a number of events offered in our benefice, each of which may assist in drawing closer to God at this Lenten season, as follows:-

Ash Wednesday (26th Feb) services, Westbury (2pm) and M'worth (7pm).

Compline – a service of quiet reflection and prayer at Northwood Green every Friday in Lent at 6.00pm for 20 minutes.

Lent Lunches Feb 29, March 7, 14, 21. 12.30pm-2.00pm, £5 per person, in aid of Gloucester City Mission, to be held at Northwood Green Hall.

Lent Course Every Tuesday in March at 4.30pm in each parish church, as fol-

lows:- 3.3 (BL), 10.3 (FL), 24.3 (MI), 31.3 (WoS). This course will follow the booklet "Tenants of the King" from Operation Noah.

Fly tipping

The FoDDC has launched a campaign about fly-tipping, a problem that we have encountered on several occasions in Westbury. As well as educating the public on what constitutes flytipping, the campaign also encourages residents and businesses to follow the campaign's S.C.R.A.P. code, which provides a checklist to follow when arranging one-off collections of waste.

The S.C.R.A.P. Code

Suspect all waste carriers; do not let them take your waste until they have proven themselves to be legitimate.

Check their waste carrier's registration details, then verify them by searching the Environment Agency or by calling 03708 506 506.

Refuse unsolicited offers to have any rubbish taken away.

Ask what exactly is going to happen to your rubbish and seek evidence that it is going to be disposed of appropriately.

Paperwork should be obtained. Make sure you get a proper invoice, waste transfer note or a receipt for your waste removal – this should give a description of the waste and provide the waste carrier's contact details.

Football Roundup

Redmarley FC 2:3 Westbury Utd

Westbury surged to 5th place in the Premier Division with a fine win, coming from behind having given up a first minute goal to the opposition. Young Ivan made a return to goalkeeping duties and pulled off several fine stops.

However, in a recurring theme the Director of Football was left to muse over the source of the goals - a creaking Mike Jeffries dragged out of retirement scored twice and ageing train driver John Westby, making his first appearance of the season slotted home a penalty.

Westbury Utd 1-2 Whitecroft FC

In the absence of a 1st team match, the 2nds took centre stage hosting Whitecroft FC A XI, who were, confusingly, really Whitecroft B. However, the main point was that the 2nds, who sadly prop up the division, were playing the only team realistically within range who sat one place higher.

Given these circumstance, one would have thought the team would have been up for it and, given the 1sts having a week off, putting a decent squad together would not be too taxing but upon arrival your correspondent was dismayed to learn that the 2nds were fielding a bare XI (numerically, not sartorially)!

On the plus side, it was good to see an invigorated Alex Wyman returning to the fold, who threw himself into the game with enthusiasm, aggression, some much needed pace and a proper footballers haircut. Young Tareeq (Terry) Thomas made a polished second appearance at left back and Andrew Jayne again turned back the clock, albeit to when he was in his mid 40s, in midfield.

Soon afterwards poor Gaz Williams got clumped on the ankle and, with no substitutes available, was forced to hobble around for the next hour, yelping with pain every time he kicked the ball. It was a brave pitiable sight and were he a race horse, any watching Vet would have started feeling a compassionate twitch in their trigger finger. Eventually he succumbed and had to leave the field but not before Whitecroft had benefited from a slight handling error by Ivan, who in his defence had previously magnificently saved a penalty. One hesitates to dwell on such misfortune (I will though) and speaking as a cricketer not entirely immune from the odd bout of the dropsies, one could only sympathise with the poor keeper who went to catch a fairly harmless shot and doubtless visualising launching an attack with a piercing throw or rifling kick could only watch in horror as the ball slipped though his grasp, popped over his shoulder and rolled into the goal area - it didn't reach the net.

Westbury bravely battled on and were not disgraced in any way fighting against the odds but didn't manage any further shots on goal. Director of Football Tempest was left scratching his head, as he shuffled off to prepare the post match Pizzas.
