

## **Our Towering Heritage**



#### Heritage Open Days

Every September, thousands of volunteers across England organise events to celebrate our fantastic history and culture. In Westbury, once again,



over two weekends, our historic parish church and, more particularly, the tower and spire, were open for the public to visit.

The tower was originally built in 1290 as a garrison to help defend the area from raids by the Welsh and the tall 160ft (49 m) broach spire was added during the 14th century. It is constructed entirely of wood, dressed by 35,000 wooden shingles, held in place by 10,000 copper nails and houses the heaviest peal of bells in Gloucestershire. It is a magnificent sight, inside and out, and when you look up at the interior structure of the building, you cannot fail to be amazed by the ingenuity of those who designed and constructed it at a time before machinery was invented. The team of volunteers were delighted to welcome a large number of visitors to

view the interior of the spire. Some of the parties were of the maximum size permitted to enter at any one time and some had travelled a considerable distance to see the tower. Simon Phelps was on hand to give them lots of interesting information about its structure and history and the teas in the church were very successful as was the plant produce stall.

As an added attraction this year, Di Landon gave an illustrated talk on the history of Westbury Workhouse, a building once on the site of the present Colchester Close, which housed around 300 inmates and dominated the village scene back in the 19th century.

This talk was also well attended and was found to be very interesting by those who came, several of whom were descendants of people who had known the workhouse all too well, having fallen on hard times when there was no other help available.

It was a great pleasure to receive additional help from a number of new volunteers this year, who helped to make this such a successful event once again.

The September Parish Hall meeting began with a minute's silence in memory of Queen Elizabeth II.

Having not had a meeting in August, there were quite a few ongoing matters to catch up with and we started with the proposed improvements to the intruder alarm system. This is quite a complicated matter as we want a secure Hall and we want the bar staff to be safe when locking up at night, but we also don't want Matty being called out at night because the alarm has gone off unnecessarily. None of us really know enough about the various options to make a decision on this with confidence, but Max Skipsey (was) volunteered to do some research on this. Our Chairman, Jan D'Ambrogio, will also talk to Westbury Surgery regarding the possibility of CCTV being installed, to check whether they would have any problem with this.

**Wifi** - The Hall's broadband contract ends at the end of October, after which the Hall will share the Severndipity broadband. However, the cricket scoreboard will not work from this and boosters are needed.

The Treasurer's report had been circulated to the committee and there had been no major changes since the last meeting. Electricity costs have risen and all hall users are asked to be mindful of the electricity they use. User groups will be asked to take meter readings so that usage can be monitored, and it was suggested that we have signs to remind people to turn off lights.

**Projects** Several marguees that are currently stored at the Hall are past their best and are taking up a lot of storage space. These marquees were used for the Summer Show in the past but it is unclear who they belong to so Jan will talk to Joe Liddington to find out. The hall floor needs re-sealing and Jan has a quote for the work and this can be met out of project funding. Jan also has a quote for replastering work that is needed in the kitchen. The number of lights in the changing rooms is to be reduced and LED lights fitted and the light on the stairs will be mended. It appears that under the Control of Asbestos Regulations 2012, those responsible for the maintenance of nondomestic premises have a 'duty to manage' the asbestos in them, to protect anyone using or working in the premises, so it was agreed that an asbestos survey should be arranged.

#### **Severndipity Report**

The Severndipity Committee had met in August. At a recent booking, there had been problems with underage drinking and people bringing alcoholic drinks on to the premises. Clarification is needed as to what area the licence covers, as there may have been underage drinking in the car park. How to deal with this situation in future was discussed and a substantial deposit that could be retained if the regulations concerning the booking were not observed was suggested. It was also felt that the bar could be closed and the guests asked to leave if the rules are broken.

The Community bar on Tuesday nights will be reviewed at the next meeting as there is not much trade. However the bar made a profit in July. It was agreed that Severndipity needs a Health and Safety Policy and that we need to check the Hall policy as well. Neil Wyman has noticed instances of rubbish dumping and drinking in the car park.

#### Fundraising

Jan reported that the Flower and Produce Show had been successful and thanked all those who had helped. It had made a profit of £402. A meeting to discuss future fund raising events was to be held the next day.

All the VIP tickets for Katie Hyett's Burlesque Night on 19<sup>th</sup> November have now been sold but other tickets are still available.

#### **GP** Surgery

Discussions are ongoing regarding rent and the tenancy and ownership of the surgery building. The surveyor representing the Hall will be asked to attend a meeting to discuss these matters with the Parish Hall committee.

Due to another booking at the Hall, the next meeting will now be on Thursday  $6^{\text{th}}$  October 2022 at 8pm.

## **Parish Council**

With no meeting in August and the September meeting later than usual due to the Queen's funeral, it is fortunate that our hard-working clerk, Fiona, keeps us up to date with various ongoing matters by e-mail, and so there was not too much to catch up on.

We began the meeting with a minute's silence in memory of the late Queen, and then, after the usual formalities, our County Councillor, Philip Robinson, gave his report. As the Gloucestershire stage of the Tour of Britain cycle race was due to take place just the day after the Queen's death, this and two later stages of the race were cancelled. This was disappointing for those involved but local residents were still able to appreciate the benefits of the road repairs that had been carried out in preparation for the event. Philip reported that the reading of the Proclamation of King Charles III from the steps of Shire Hall was attended by many.

Philip was pleased to say that 1,680 Ukrainian refugees are now safe in



Gloucestershire, with 260 in the Forest of Dean, and 319 Ukrainian children now have places in Gloucestershire schools. He was

also pleased to report that the County Council has received  $\pounds 2.7$  million from the UK Share Prosperity Fund for a programme to improve adult numeracy, using all sorts of new ways of teaching.

After thanking Philip Robinson for his report and for his support with local issues, Chairman Simon Phelps moved on to the rest of the agenda. Fiona had not received any response to the invitation to local residents to join the Parish Council, following John Henry's departure, but Ben Stephens' name had now been put forward as willing to serve and it was agreed that he would now be co-opted. Unfortunately, he was unable to attend this meeting but he will be very welcome at future meetings.

Also unable to attend was Jeff Wheeler from the Public Rights of Way team, who we were hoping would be there to discuss a footpath access problem that has been going on for years. He had phoned, however, and a future date to meet him on site is to be arranged.

There were no members of the public present so we then moved on to planning, but there was only one application which was for Listed Building Consent for alterations at Ninnage Lodge which we noted. More complicated was the response to the consultation by Forest of Dean District council about their Second Preferred Options Strategy. This is a plan to provide for the needs of the district over the next 20 years and includes how the environment will be protected, how the impacts of climate change will be reduced and how and where new development will be expected to take place. The first Strategy proposed a new settlement at Churcham whereas this one proposes major development at Lydney as a focal point for the Forest of Dean District, development of land at Newent, redevelopment and regeneration of land at Beachley Camp and the support of mixed use developments at major villages and towns as well as sustainable development at some smaller villages.

**Finance** The accounts were agreed and had been passed by the external auditors. The first stage of work on the school playing field has now been completed and paid for out of existing funds, and Fiona had done considerable work on finding the best way to pay for the remaining fencing work. It was agreed that there was merit in delaying the next stage of the work, as the school will still have the existing playing field and it would give the new grass time to gain some strength before being used by the school children. This would then bring us to a time when we will also have next year's precept, and could therefore reduce the amount we need to borrow to £25,000 over 10 years, which can then be repaid without having to increase the precept.

**Highways** We had hoped that Network Rail would, by now, have cleared the scrub from their land alongside the railway track at Jordans Hill to improve visibility for drivers, but they have not yet done so and Simon has written to them to chase them up. Fiona had got our application for new vehicle activated speed signs in to the County Council with appropriate speed but we will need to give further



consideration to what type of signs we agree to. Any of the alternatives will be lighter and easier to handle than the

existing ones, which Peter Radley has been moving and recharging for four years now, but there is a possibility that the Automatic Number Plate Recognition cameras will be costly in that the Parish Council would have to pay to send out letters to any drivers who have exceeded the speed limit. Fiona will make further enquiries about this.

**Burial Ground Extension and School Playing Field** A surveyor will be valuing the land to be leased to the school and a solicitor will be appointed to draw up a new lease and negotiate the rent.

**Play Area** Mike Townsend requested some materials so that he can carry out some more repairs to the Wetpour surface. The repairs that he has done previously have been very successful and all agree that this work is prolonging the life of the play surface.



Around the Parish A request to place a memorial bench in the burial ground was agreed. The problem of parking for home-

owners in the village had been raised and was discussed, but as a Parish Council it was felt that we were not in a position to solve this.

The amount of litter around the area has built up again and it was agreed to organise another litterpick on 22<sup>nd</sup> October. It was acknowledged that some of the problem is due to the recycling bin lorries not closing their doors as they travel between pick ups and Simon has reported this. If you have evidence of this happening, we would ask that you share it with us.

Our next meeting is on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> October at 7pm. Di Landon


Let us all meet up again on Saturday the 1st of October at Northwood Green Social Hall, 10.00am - Noon
