#### **Parish Council**

Our May Parish Council meeting is always a little confusing as it technically comprises three meetings, each of which covers a different aspect of the Council's business.

So we started with the Annual Parish Meeting and after the usual formalities we briefly discussed the annual police and crime figures which had been circulated to us. These were presented differently from previous years with 49 categories of crime listed, but the overall picture shows a decrease of 11% in incidents reported to the police this past year compared to the previous year.

Chairman Simon Phelps then gave his report on a year marked by the very sad death of our fellow councillor, Philip Woodman, and also the death of our past Chairman Philip Horsley. We had also lost John Henry from our council when he moved to Newnham, but were pleased to welcome Ben Stephens in his place.

Simon then reported on the significant progress with the school playing field and burial ground extension, which has been an arduous and costly exercise. The closure of Westbury Court Care Home has been a serious loss and there is considerable concern over the future of the Doctor's surgery at the Parish Hall. Simon stressed that the Parish Council extends its fullest support to the community and the Parish Hall Committee in their efforts to retain this facility in the long term.

The District Council's new housing strategy is still unclear and the standard of maintenance of the parish roads remains a matter of great concern. However, Church Lane and Lower Ley Lane have been completely relaid. Speeding traffic and the lack of a safe crossing point in the village remain a problem and Network Rail still deny responsibility for the safety

of road users at Jordan Hill railway bridge, where overgrown vegetation impedes visibility. The churchyard working parties continue and there has been a notable increase of wild flowers under the new management system.

Simon finished by giving thanks to our County Councillor, Philip Robinson, for his assistance, to our Parish Clerk, Fiona Wallbank for her efficiency and careful management of the parish finances and to all his fellow councillors for their support and excellent attendance at meetings. As our District Councillor, Simon also reported on the recent election results which mean that the District Council now comprises 15 Greens, 11 Independents, 5 Labour, 4 Conservative and 3 Lib Dems. Only one member of the public attended the meeting, and her concern was the future of the GP surgery in Westbury. Simon, in his report, had shown that we very much shared this concern and would do all we could to ensure that the surgery remained

We then moved on to the Annual Council Meeting at which Simon Phelps was reelected as Chair and I was re-elected as Vice-Chair. Richard Hewlett and Jeff Williams will continue as snow and flood wardens, Debbie Hill will continue as Emergency Planner and I will carry on as Parish Council rep on the Hall committee. And so, on to our usual monthly meeting.

#### **Planning**

There were only two planning applications, one for the replacement of velux windows with dormers at South View in Northwood Green, and the other for the erection of an agricultural building at Cleeve Farm, and there were no objections to either of these. Fiona then updated us on some earlier applications including the withdrawal of applications for two self-build dwellings in Ley Lane and glamping pods at Sunnybank in Elton,

and the granting of permission for an extension and side porch at Riverdene Cottage in Flaxley and an agricultural building in Goose Lane.

#### **County Councillor report**

By this time our County Councillor, Philip Robinson, had joined us and gave his report. The state of the roads was discussed at some length. Philip said that the bad winter weather had done a considerable amount of damage and an extra £4m had been assigned to highway maintenance in addition to the £100m already allocated and 39,000 pot holes had been repaired. Several people had commented that sometimes pot holes were repaired when others nearby were not.. Philip said that this was because there were strict criteria for safety defects and that they only fill the ones that meet these criteria. He also said that repairs are not so effective when carried out in wet conditions. but a new product is being tried, which, although expensive, is much more durable when used in wet weather. Chairman Simon is in the process of arranging an inspection of the parish's roads with Councillor Robinson and the Highways Manager as soon as possible.

Sadly, we heard that Westbury Court Care Home is to be sold. We also discussed our concerns regarding the GP surgery with Philip, and he said that he would follow this up with the County Council Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care Commissioning.

Philip also reported that the Speedwatch scheme seems to be working well and that 90% of drivers issued with letters have needed no further intervention and that 130,000 trees have been planted this year and they hope to have planted a million by 2030.

**Finance** Fiona reported that the internal audit had been completed in readiness for the external auditor and the accounts were signed.

#### Highways

An area of the pavement through the village has become very weed infested and will be reported to the Highways department. Hunt Hill potholes are still a problem and Simon is preparing a list of problems for his meeting with the Highways Manager.

# **Burial Ground Extension and School Playing Field**

Work will be starting on the new fencing during half term and will probably take two weeks. The new playing field's drainage was well tested during the recent very heavy rainfall and it certainly passed the test. There has still been no agreement with the County Council regarding the lease and rent and Councillor Robinson will be asked to intervene.

Around the Parish Mike Townsend will repair the wetpour on the play area now that the weather is better. After further enquiries, it has been decided that the watch tower on Walmore Common is in too poor a state to apply for listing. Quotes are to be requested for work need on a couple of the parish's bus shelters. The next meeting will be held on Mon-

he bar was not open for our May Parish Hall meeting so we met in the lounge rather than the main hall – a rather more comfortable option. There were a few apologies, but fifteen of us were present and Chair Jan D'Ambrogio took the opportunity to suggest that in future we meet at 7.30pm rather than 8pm, which most of us felt would be an improvement. There were a few matters arising from last month's minutes - most of which are in the process of being sorted. The new key fobs were due to arrive the next day and Jan will be getting some new keys. Jan also mentioned that she is planning to have a discussion with the GP surgery regarding some extra utility costs arising from the surgery now being open five days a week.

Treasurer's Report Sarah Mitten had circulated the accounts and these have also been registered with the Charities Commission. There had been little change, with utility costs still high, but some funds had been received under covenant from the Severndipity Club.

**Projects** Although there are several projects on the list, the work on the faults mentioned in the Electrical Installation Condition report have taken priority and an electrician is coming to attend to these. Clive Tempest has found someone to give us a quote for repairing the peeling hall roof but repairing the pot holes in the car park is more of a problem as, with the surgery open all week, the car park is in use nearly all the time.

Severndipity (Bar) Ken Boulton reported that the bar will no longer be open on Tuesdays but will open on Wednesdays when there are some cricket matches. The bar take increased a little last month but the bar, like many pubs, is not the profitable venture that it once was. This led to some discussion about how to reduce costs and increase sales and it was agreed that we look at this again when everyone has had a chance to study the Severndipity Club's accounts after their upcoming Annual General Meeting. Fundraising events that attract large numbers would help with the sales and a plan to change the bar layout in order to reduce ullage will help reduce costs, but the main difference from former times is that the bar is no longer manned by a pool of

Fundraising Jan reported on the Coronation weekend events. The cream tea had gone well, the Coronation-themed quiz was very well attended and quite a lot of litter was collected on the Bank Holiday Monday. The next event is the Craft Fair on 9<sup>th</sup> July and Sarah Mitten reported that she has received bookings for 19 stalls already and more are expected. A query arose about car parking that day as there are sheep grazing on the rugby field which is usually used on these occasions as an overflow car park, but Ken Boulton agreed that the sheep can be penned for the day. The Flower and Produce Show will be held on Sunday 3rd September and other events are planned for the autumn.

**Doctor's Surgery** As reported last month, Gen Riley has been trying to arrange a face-to-face meeting regarding a new lease, but although she has received an acknowledgement of her e-mail, there has been no further response. The situation is becoming increasingly exasperating and there was considerable discussion about how we should deal with the prob-

lem. It was agreed that we need to decide on a clear set of criteria that have been agreed by the committee as a whole, and then take a strong line with NHS Property Services in order to settle the matter.

Any Other Business July 22<sup>nd</sup> is going to be a 'very full car park day,' as there are bookings for a wedding, a cricket match and the Rugby Club are now hosting a Sevens Tournament that day! However, all the hosts of these events were represented at the meeting and were happy that it would all be manageable – but if you're going to the Hall that day it might be an idea to car share or go by bike!

Nik Edginton reported that she is making progress with the risk assessment, Brian Wyman asked for an adjustment to the heating for short mat bowls and Mark Brill and Tim Smith will carry out the fire risk assessment. So the meeting ended, but instead of adjourning to the bar, we just went home!



#### Cricket

Cricket is back! After a slight false start caused by the deluge of rain, the season at last got out of the starting blocks in May. Credit should be given to Ted Edginton and Ian Dunn and their helpers for managing to get not one but two squares and outfields ready given the monsoon conditions of April.

Firstly the 1sts, whose numbers have been bolstered by young antipodean, Kade Clowes, who has made an encouraging start to the season having taken 10 wickets already before some of us have even managed to get our boots on. Alex Wyman has also made an encouraging start, knocking off 69 runs in only 66 balls and amassing over 100 runs already. That said, the 1sts came up a little short losing to Lydney by 33 runs and Aston Ingham by 31 runs, but as the wickets dry out we hope for better news.

The 2nds haven't had much luck with the weather, playing only one game so far with Ian Dunn (49) and skipper Glyn Bayley (61) getting the side off to a great start, but unfortunately things subsided somewhat afterwards and they found themselves stuck on 154-6 at the end,

chasing 220-9 at Ruardean Hill. Some consolation may have come with the magnificent teas they provide up there.

The newly formed 3rds, their existence a testament to the burgeoning club numbers caused by a thriving youth section growing up and a few older players refusing to retire, is skippered by Chris Wayman and have managed to get in a couple of matches. Their first a real nailbitter in which they defeated Ruardean Hill 2nds by 5 runs with father and son combination of Alan Kane (36) and Ethan Kane (56) providing the bulk of the runs.

Their second match against Aston Ingham 3rds was a low scoring affair played at Newnham cricket pitch (remember the two squares mentioned earlier, that's the second one). Aston Ingham were restricted to 119-9 with Andrew Cueto bowling an excellent spell for 3-15 and leg spinner Eve Powell claiming 2-17 including, rather pleasingly, getting their own leg spinner out stumped by the excellent glove work of keeper Tallia Scott. Beth Powell and Charlotte Dunn also put in accurate bowling spells and at tea the home side felt pretty content with their bowling and fielding efforts.

Unfortunately the batting display didn't quite match up as your correspondent's cunning plan of seeing off the opening bowler was rather taken to extremes as five overs were blocked out for precisely no runs at all and then almost as soon as the softer bowling came on, he contrived to run himself out through a catastrophic misjudgment involving momentarily believing he could run as fast as he could when he was eighteen. Sadly he couldn't as was fractionally (5 yards) short of his ground. While skipper Wayman (31 n.o) was patiently knocking the runs off at one end, wickets fell regularly at the other. Luckily the 3rds had one last ace up their sleeve, as in strode the magnificent figure of club president Clive Tempest with a

Bothamsque swagger. As he surveyed the field his eyes narrowed, looking for weaknesses and gaps in the field. What followed was an exhibition in swiping and whacking and nurdling and cutting until half an hour later he was run out fractionally short of his ground, having amassed (checks notes) er...one run. When wondering out loud over a post match beer where it all went wrong he was gently reminded that he is 81.

The innings subsided to 88 all out but an encouraging first couple of games for the new team, particularly on the bowling front, and we look forward to the season ahead.
