



The Season for Beauty and the Beast

B eauty and the Beast" was this year's offering for the demanding Westbury public, who were hungry for entertainment, even after the superb meal provided by Jan D'Ambrogio and her hardworking team. This classic story shows that we should never judge based on appearances. The ugly Beast must be a baddy? A sword is a sword? Simon Roberts is a busty red-head? Think again! What we got was a rambunctious, funfilled evening full of giggles, guffaws and yes, many belly laughs - a true reflection of Director Mark Landon's modus operandi and probably the best production since The Hobbit (author P Moscrop -Ed). Beauty was played by the wonderful, youthful, scrumptious, Leanne Roseblade-Bargh, a delectable leading lady who understandably captured the Beast's heart and also contributed approximately 95% of the musical ability to their duets. Her sisters (Simon Roberts and David D'Ambrogio), convincingly demonstrated how unfortunate genetics may translate into spiteful, greedy, selfish behaviour, an interesting counterpoint to the Beast's kindly nature. Tim Smith was in his element playing this misunderstood grotesque.

Well, we have all been there – that moment when the world becomes too futile, inexplicable or illogical and the only thing to do is dissolve into helpless hilarity – that is what happened to Patience Fawcett-Till when playing a salt cellar for the fifth night just became too much, a magical few minutes for everyone. Impressively, the other household objects managed to hold it together, Hannah

McCartney as the Clock and George Ford as the Candelabra providing professional levels of continuity. Of course, our lovely fairy (Zoe Fransham) also helped in maintaining the narrative, and in a fabulous French accent too. She also had some pretty good jokes showing that Director, Writer and Actor Mark Landon did not keep all the best lines for himself as Gaston de Mucksplatter (standing in for a sadly stricken Colin Cotterell, struck down with a nasty chest infection -Ed). Landon was supposed to be devastatingly handsome and the magic of theatre is such that this was achieved by drawing a curly moustache on his face. Mucksplatter was working in league with Captain Slackmarrow (Adrian Crompton). In case we were in any doubt as to the Cap-



tain's bon a fides, he dis-played all the usual seafaring attributes;

parrot, wooden leg and so on. Opportunistically, he shared the remarkable series of events that led to his pretty comprehensive disfigurement in front of curtain whilst a major scene change occurred.

All the performances were good, Muck-splatter's two goons Flotsam (Amelie Phillips) and Jetsam (Caitlin Bennett) were clearly more intelligent that their boss and Andrew Landon imbued soul and depth to his drunken sailor. And of course no one could forget Clive Tempest's Hugh Jardon. It was great to see how high the morale of the cast was and one can only imagine the enjoyment everyone must have had in creating this excellent effort. Great work by Prompt Catlin Reilly and all the backstage crew

(Elke Landon, Di Landon, Claire McCartney, Stuart Hawke, Sue Pemberton, Mike Edginton, Brian Wyman, Mike Matthews, Nicola Atkinson and team, Jake Landon, with a special mention for May Brass on the costumes side).

In case you are wondering, of course all the baddies got their dues (banished to Lydnee) and Beauty and Beast get hitched. So yes, we should value inner characteristics like kindness and patience more than superficial qualities such as a curly moustache and voluminous hair. But the real moral, of course, is that if you are rich and have a nice castle, eventually a girl will fall for you.

ing the picnic table in the play area and planters at the Parish Hall, so we would like to express our thanks to all those involved.

There are now books in place and it is ready for use. So, if you take a book out, please either put it back when you have read it, or replace it with another. Children's books will be kept on the lower shelves.

Parish Council

Our first Parish Council meeting of the New Year was a very sad one as we were meeting without our friend and fellow councillor, Philip Woodman, who had died very suddenly since we last met. Our thoughts and sympathies are with his family but we too will greatly miss him and we held a minute's silence in his memory.

There were no members of the public present and County Councillor Philip Robinson had also sent his apologies.

Planning We had no objections to an application from Westbury Court Gardens for work on trees that are growing too close to each other or to an application for prior approval for the conversion of an existing barn at Cotshill Farm, Lower Ley Lane to a residential dwelling. We were also notified of amendments regarding the application for an extension at Cleeve Holme to which we had no objections. The application for an Agricultural Trailer Sales and Servicing Depot at Elton was due to be reheard at the January Planning Committee meeting the following day and Peter Radley was intending to speak.

Highways After the accounts had been agreed we moved on to the numerous problems with our roads. Chairman Simon Phelps is in touch with Highways on a very regular basis and will emphasise how bad the pot holes are now, especially along Rodley Road. (These have since been marked) Predictably, flooding has been a problem in several places and although teams have been out clearing the grips, in many places the gratings are blocked. There has been flooding at Adsett outside The Glen which is due to a long running issue with highways and there is also a new problem with flooding near Frocester House in Northwood Green which Simon is pursuing. In Ampney Lane, the manhole has been overflowing with sewage and all these problems will be taken up with the Highways Department and Severn Trent. Simon will also be in touch with them regarding the grit bins, as it does not appear that these have been refilled, and some are damaged.

A parishioner had raised the issue of road safety involved in crossing the A48. We had been told that a 40 mph buffer zone was being considered by the police for both sides of the 30 mph zone through the village, designed to slow traffic from the top of Wintles Hill to Jordans Hill bridge, and that a pedestrian crossing near the Water Gardens was also under consideration to make access to the Doctor's Surgery safer for pedestrians. There has been no progress with this and so Simon has asked the Police and Crime Commissioner to ensure that a police representative is at the next Road Safety meeting so that this can be discussed further.

Aylburton, like Westbury, has unsuccessfully campaigned for a crossing for many

years and on 20th February they are holding a "mass crossing" demonstration in support of their campaign and have invited us to do likewise. They have suggested that we time ours for 2pm so please let me know if you are interested in joining this.

Simon had recently seen contractors working at Jordans Hill and hoped that

they might be doing the long awaited clearance of the trees and bushes that block the view for approaching motorists, but was told that they were just clearing enough to enable the structure of the bridge to be inspected during the overnight road closure. We thought that this work would have been done by now and so have asked Fiona to write to our MP Mark Harper (also Secretary of State for Transport) to ask him to push for this to be completed.

Around the Village There has been no progress regarding the rent for the new school playing field but the drainage has been well tested by some heavy rainfall and is working very well. Our planned clean up of the play area at the Parish Hall had to be postponed due to bad weather, and will now be on Sat 18th February. A new seat for the baby swing is on order. Footpaths Mike Townsend has been in touch with Jeff Wheeler of the Public Rights of Way team regarding problems with the footbridge at Broadoak and a blocked path near Northwood Green, and a new stile has been installed at Church Lane. The telephone kiosk in the village is now up and running as a very welcome **book exchange** (see p 2). Concerns have been raised regarding the new rules whereby voters have to provide photo ID at the polling station for the next elections on 4th May 2023 (see next column) A parishioner has also written to the Health Secretary regarding Westbury Court Care Home remaining empty when patients are being discharged to hotels due to the need for hospital beds emphasising a point that was made when we argued against the Home being closed.

Our next meeting will be on Monday 20th February at 7pm at the Parish Hall.

New Voting Rules

The UK Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station. This new requirement will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023.

Forms of ID that can be used to vote?

Passport

Photo driving licence (including provisional licence)

Blue badge

Certain concessionary travel cards
Identity card with PASS mark
Biometric Immigration document
Defence identity card
Certain national identity cards

If you do not have an acceptable form of photographic ID Electors can apply for a free voter ID docu-

ment, known as a **Voter Authority Certificate**. They can apply for this at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk or we can send paper application forms. You will need to send a photo, like a passport photo or you can go to the Council Offices in Coleford for help to apply.

Postal voting

Postal voters will not be affected and will be issued with their postal ballot papers as usual.

Postal Votes: If you want to vote by post (or proxy) you will only qualify for one in time for the elections if you are (or will be) registered in time to vote at the elections.

Deadlines:

Register to voter = Monday 17 April Postal vote applications = 5pm Tuesday 18 April

Proxy application = 5pm Tuesday 25 April



With all the festivities that have kept most of us busy since the December meeting, it is not surprising that there were one or two things that were described as 'ongoing' at the January meeting. The Hall's security and WiFi systems came into that category but both are working satisfactorily at the moment, Jan will shortly be talking to Joe Liddington about the marquees in storage and we have not heard any more regarding the issues with the Doctor's surgery lease.

There has, however, been progress with the water meter, which has now been raised up in the ditch, an asbestos assessment, which was due to take place the morning after our meeting and Mike Edginton has repaired the bollard near the gas tank and completed the work in the cooler room.

Ken Boulton reported that there has been some sign of improvement in the income from the bar, and that they have been able to lessen the losses due to ullage. It was suggested that some form of external lighting to show when the bar is open would be helpful and this will be followed up.

Treasurer's Report It was a pleasure to have Sarah Mitten back with us in person this month and to hear that all is well with the Hall finances, although rising utility prices are still a matter of concern. The accounts are in the process of being audited ready for the Annual General Meeting.

Fundraising Chairman Jan D'Ambrogio reported that the Kebabaret and the

had been very successful, and the monthly Nosh and Natters continue to provide a steady income. Our fundraisers will be meeting in February to plan more events for the coming year but 26th February is already booked for another Old-Fashioned Jumble Sale. It was agreed that we need to liaise with other local fundraisers so that our events do not overlap or clash with theirs. The Hall's funds have recently been boosted by a generous bequest in the will of former Hall chairman Phil Horsley, for which we are most grateful

Jan gave us the good news that the Hall had received the highest rating after a recent Food Safety Inspection. She is also registering as a catering business (called Mrs D's Pots and Pans) with the Forest of Dean and will then be able to provide a catering service for weddings or other events at the Hall, which may help to boost bookings.

Any Other Business Jan has been trying to get a smart meter provided by EDF to monitor the Hall's gas and electricity usage but, as we know, it seems impossible to get through to anyone on the phone at the moment. Jane Townsend reported that Flaxley School Room is taking part in the Warm Space initiative (see p 8) This led to a discussion of whether the Hall should provide something similar, and it was felt that further information is needed to ensure that the right sort of help was available at the right times to aid those who needed help most. It was agreed that we discuss this again when we know more.

Brian Wyman had noticed that some of the Hall's cupboards need repair and kindly offered to do this after the pantomime, and Mike Edginton offered to clear away the pile of wood behind the surgery. So with plans for the future in mind, the meeting concluded and we moved to the bar.

Wildlife in our Churchyard

As you know, the Heritage Lottery Fund gave generous funding for our church spire and in return requested that the closed churchyard should be nurtured as a wildlife area. For the last four years, the volunteers on our monthly working parties have been striving towards this and more recently, James Walkley-Cox has been caring for the churchyard with the same aim. Our January working party had to be cancelled because of bad

weather but, weather permitting, we shall have another go on Saturday 11th February from 10am until 1pm.

In the meantime, James has written the following about the wildlife that he has seen in the churchyard and we hope that, even in winter, you might like to have a walk around and see for yourself.

Birds

While there is not so much avian activity in the winter, the wonderfully entertaining jackdaws are year-round residents and will be seen squabbling in the large fir or foraging on the ground for insects. The abundance of mistletoe, holly, ivy and yew berries throughout the churchyard means the thrush family is well represented and in winter, the usual blackbirds and song thrushes are often joined by a mistle thrush, which always seems more

intent on guarding the berries than actually eating them. The trademark drill-like churr call can be heard when-

ever another bird dares to land anywhere near fruit that the mistle thrush has claimed as his own. After the first redwings and fieldfares arrive, usually in mid-November, the poor thing is outnumbered and inevitably has to admit defeat. The corvid family are well represented in the churchyard. Alongside the jackdaws, rooks, magpies and carrion crows are regular visitors. I've seen jay in the churchvard too. Overhead vou can add to the list with a raven if your luck is in the jackdaw will let you know they are about as they rise up to defend their territory. Listen out for the raven's distinctive honk of annoyance.

The skies over the churchyard are well worth watching. Alongside the raven there is a chance of sparrowhawk, buzzard, red kite and kestrel (one of which roosted in the churchyard over the winter of 2021). Others I have observed over the winter churchyard include heron, cormorant, gulls, ducks and geese.

Back on ground level, wood pigeon and collared dove will visit daily. There is a decent list of LBJs (little brown jobs) – dunnock, wren, robin (a great all year round singer too), house sparrow...and some more colourful types too: coal, great, blue and long-tailed tits; pied wagtail (look up to the gutter and roof of the church), goldcrest love the yews' cover (especially the large yew next to the front entrance of the church) and finches – goldfinch, chaffinch, bullfinch and siskin all appear on my churchyard tick list in recent years.

Mammals

Mice and voles are abundant in the churchyard but are rarely seen in winter – it is too cold and dangerous for them to venture out in the daytime. The grey squirrel is your best chance of a mammal spot (unless you stay late enough for some bat spotting) especially near the oak trees.

Flowers

January brings the first signs of primrose, lesser celandine and snowdrops. The first primroses tend to break through by the road end of the churchyard by the kissing gate and spread throughout the churchyard into February and March.

Philip Woodman 17.12.71—7.1.23



Westbury Church was barely big enough to hold all those who came to celebrate Philip's all too short life, and the wonderful tributes paid to him by his family summed up why we were all there. His love of life, learning and laughter, together with a smile that could light up a room, were qualities which we all knew him for.

Philip lived all his life on Broken Cross Farm and went to Westbury School and, later, Kings School, which led to his lifelong love of cathedrals. He became an active member of Westbury Young Farmers where he developed numerous skills including public speaking and flower arranging. This was an unusual hobby for a teenage boy at that time but he had found it a very good way to meet girls!

Having studied at Hartpury and worked on the family farm, Phil became a land-scape gardener and then an agricultural lecturer at Hartpury, where he found his true vocation. Messages received by his family from his former students show that he was 'a brilliant teacher', 'a true gentleman', 'a brilliant laugh' and 'an absolute legend'.

Philip was also active in the local community, serving as school governor for many years and remaining a member of the PCC and the Parish Council up until his death.

When Philip had a stroke three years ago,

his life changed dramatically but the stroke did not change who he was as a person. His determination to get better, his wonderful sense of humour and his ability to look on the bright side, were truly inspiring and while he had lost so much, he never lost sight of what he still had

Much has been said about his love of life, but most of all he loved his family and his children Tom, Emily and Wilf were his pride and joy. His time spent with them gave him great happiness and they will always cherish all the wonderful memories that he gave them. We will all miss him very much and our hearts go out to his family who have lost such a wonderful husband, father, son, brother.

December Weather
