Our July Parish Hall meeting was held in the main hall, which meant that we were all able to see how much better it looks for its fresh coat of paint before we got on with the business of the evening. There were no matters arising from the minutes of the June meeting so we then went straight to the . .

Treasurer's Report Sarah Mitten had circulated the accounts for the year so far and advised us that the Hall's finances are fairly stable. The greatest concern is the high cost of the Hall's utilities and Jan D'Ambrogio has been doing considerable research to find the best possible rates and has now got a new contract at a cheaper rate. Jan is also trying to get a smart meter installed to help identify where economies could be made. It was agreed that notices should be on display reminding hall users to turn off any unnecessary lighting.

Hall maintenance A lot of the electrical work that was required has been completed, at a cost of over £2000, but there is still more to be done in order to comply with legislation and insurance requirements and estimates for this work are being obtained.

Discussion of all this highlighted the enormous amount of time and effort that Jan puts in to her role as Chairperson, especially as she also takes all the bookings and does a huge amount on the fundraising side as well. In view of her stated intention of standing down at the next AGM, it seems highly unlikely that anyone else will want to take on this role

unless the work is more evenly shared among the rest of us on the Hall Management committee and by the wider community. A mixture of people is needed including those with up-to-date and practical knowledge and skills and those who are available during the day when it is necessary to open the Hall for hirers and contractors, for example. It was agreed that Jan will make a list of all the jobs that she does so that we can look at how best to share them out.

Doctor's surgery Gen Riley was not at the meeting to update us on any progress with the lease. An approach has been made to the Parish Council to see if any financial help might be available to help with the costs involved in providing a separate electrical supply for the surgery.

Projects As agreed last month, the variance projects are the list one to be least an

ous projects on the list are to be kept on hold until the more pressing electrical works have been completed and paid for.

Severndipity (Bar) report Val Morgan-Townsend reported that the regular bars were doing better than this time last year and that there had been a couple of extra events that had produced good bar takes.

Fundraising Jan reported that there had been twenty bookings for stalls at the recent Craft Fair but there had been a lot of late cancellations. However, there were nine excellent stalls which did well. A profit was also made on the refreshments — bacon butties and home-made cakes always go down well!

Westbury Players

Westbury Players have been busy cleaning up the container that houses all their costumes. More work is needed on it, but Act 1 is complete



Summer is also the traditional time for us to have our American Supper and so we had a very pleasant evening catching up with each other and enjoying great food and good company.



Parish Council

We had a full complement of councillors at the July Parish Council meeting including our newly co-opted councillor, Richard Hewlett, who was warmly welcomed. The minutes of the previous meeting were agreed and there were no members of the public present so our County Councillor, Philip Robinson, was invited to give his report so that he could move on to another meeting.

As cabinet member for Economy, Education and Skills, he wished to let us know that the Adult Education Service, which reaches many adults who missed out on their education the first time round, had recently been rated as 'Good' by Ofsted. He was also pleased that the County Council has agreed to spend £16.5m on a school for pupils with special needs in Gloucester. This is not funded by Council Tax but via the Government's Dedicated Schools Grant. The school will provide 200 places for children with learning difficulties, aged four to 16. As well as improving the experience of pupils, it will save money currently spent on out-ofcounty placements, which can cost as much as £50,000 a year.

We then had a chance to raise various concerns about pot holes and the long grass on local verges which restricts vision for motorists. Philip assured us that as well as a new "pothole buster" there are also eight new teams working on the smaller pot holes in the county. Richard Hewlett mentioned a recent road closure in Rodley, which had caused inconvenience for drivers, but did not get the pot holes filled because it rained.

Planning The application for the erection of a detached dwelling on land north of The Tynings at Walmore Hill had been withdrawn and an application for change of use of a disused farm building to workshops at Leycott Farm met with no objec-

tions. Gloucestershire Highways had applied for permission to pollard the two



lime trees in the village which we supported. Fiona updated us on an earlier application regarding Thistlemoor in Church Lane,

which had been granted.

Finance The monthly accounts were agreed and signed.

Highways As mentioned last month, Chairman Simon Phelps had been in touch with Severn Trent about the manhole covers in the village and had asked them to make it a priority. The noise made as traffic passes over them both day and night must be really irritating to those living nearby. When there was no sign of them being replaced, Simon had to get in touch with the CEO of Severn Trent but has now been told they will be dealt with overnight on 24th July. So hopefully, by the time you read this, peace will have been restored in the village! It is understood that the replacements may be an improved type, as this has been a recurring problem. Since Simon's tour of the village with Highways representatives, lots of white markings around potholes have appeared so we hope that these will be fixed in the near future. There were also reports of the footway at Broadoak having become overgrown and an unruly hedge causing a problem on the A4151.

Burial Ground Extension

Agreement has now been reached with the County Council regarding an increase in the rent to be paid for the school's enlarged playing field, and this is to be reviewed in five years time. Our thanks go to our County Councillor for his support in this matter. Locks have now been requested for the gates. It is good to see that the grass is growing well on the new playing field and it has now had two or three cuts.

Play Area The picnic table was badly damaged recently and Simon from Severn Valley Woodworks advised that it is beyond repair and kindly offered to give us a new one. The picnic area with its table has been used and enjoyed so much over the last few years that we are all very grateful to the Woodworks for this donation. Michael Townsend has been in touch with the Community Payback team and they have agreed to repaint the two seats, clean the wetpour surface and trim the play area boundary.

Footpaths Some bridge repairs have been carried out but a stile is needed over a new gate on the footpath near the Smokery.

Climate Change I shared information from the Forest Climate Network regarding an organisation being developed by local authorities, including the FoD District Council, which aims to increase understanding and awareness for homeowners about the benefits of having a lower carbon home and how best to achieve this. They are working on a website that will give easy access to information and advice. I am now also representing the Parish Council on the Forest Climate Adaptation and Resilience Project, which aims to prepare communities for changes in the environment due to hotter summers and the increased risk of flooding in winter.

Doctor's Surgery Following last month's request from the Parish Hall committee for some assistance with the costs which have been and will be incurred in ensuring that we keep a doctor's surgery in the parish, Fiona had made enquiries to the Gloucestershire Association of Parish and Town Councils

(GAPTC) regarding whether the Parish Council could help with this and had been advised that this would be possible if a public meeting indicated that residents supported this. More information regarding the costs involved in installing a separate electricity supply for the surgery building is needed and the Parish Council would be unable to help during the current financial year anyway, so this is something for future consideration.

Community Transport We were pleased to hear that Neil Tappin has now taken on the role of voluntary community driver for Lydcare. Over the years this service has been such a help to those without their own transport and we are so pleased that it is now available again. It was agreed that our annual donation to Lydcare will be resumed in September and our thanks go to Neil for providing this service.

Bus Shelters Fiona is still gathering estimates for the work needed on some of the shelters.

Around the Parish Last month's request for a financial contribution towards the cost of providing a defibrillator for the Elton Area was considered and it was agreed that a donation of £50 would be made towards this.

Other matters The recent response by the Fire Service to a report of a sheep in the river indicated that better access to local knowledge in such circumstances would reduce costs and prove effective. It was felt that this would also have helped with the way that the risk of flooding was treated last winter and Simon Phelps will talk to the County Council and the emergency services about trying to improve communication.

Unless any urgent matters arise, there will be no Parish Council meeting in August and the next meeting will be on **Monday** 18th September at 7pm. *Di Landon*

Jordan Hill Railway Bridge

he recent accident that occurred when a motorcyclist was injured at Jordan Hill railway bridge highlights the dangers of this stretch of road, which are largely due to poor visibility. Westbury Parish Council has been campaigning for at least 16 years to remedy this and last year Simon Phelps attended Network Rail's information event at Awre Village Hall to request that the scrub growth on the railway embankment should be cleared. Following that meeting, he received correspondence from Network Rail that it would attend to the problem during last summer's six week closure of the line for maintenance work at Etloe.



e v e r, nothing was done and he has repeatedly chased Network

Rail and GCC Highways about the problem. GCC Highways has acknowledged the dangers and they intend to improve the signage, but as the Parish Council have discussed on many occasions, the speed limit needs to be extended to the Elton Corner side of Jordan Hill and better road markings are required. GCC Highways have approached Network Rail and stated that they (GCC Highways) are prepared to clear the scrub growth, but Network Rail has refused to allow them access.

When Simon suggested to Network Network Rail that they clear the embankment themselves during this year's closure of the line for further operations at Etloe, they replied that "scrub clearance would in Network Rail's opinion only

encourage the road traffic to travel faster and therefore make the situation more dangerous."

In a letter that was printed in both The Forester and The Forest Review at the beginning of this month, Simon pointed out the years that Westbury Parish Council have attempted to get both GCC Highways and Network Rail to attend to this matter, and also drew attention to the fact that at some point in the future a serious accident is going to happen resulting in life changing injuries or, worse, still a loss of life.

Update Simon has now had an email from Network Rail, saying they are now "considering " a site meeting to discuss the safety aspects of the situation!

Road and Footpath Closures

Network Rail are planning to close Church Lane to vehicles from 6am on Monday 31 July until 6am on Wednesday 2 August 2023 for work on upgrading the level crossing.

Footpath EWS 63, between Brook Farm and Blaisdon Road, will be closed from 6am on 7th Aug until 5am on 11th Aug (or when the work is finished) for construction work connected to the upgrading of the railway crossing.

Part of Ley Lane will be closed from 4th Sept to 6th Sept for pipe repair by Severn Trent.

Also, Network Rail will be upgrading the railway tracks at Grange Court and apologise for the noise disturbance for those living nearby. They will be working round the clock from Monday 7 – Friday 11 **Aug** and Monday 14 – Friday 18 Aug On Saturday 19 – Sunday 20 August Single overnight shift: 12:40am – 8:15am Saturday 9 – Sunday 10 **Sept** Single overnight shift: 12:35am – 8:15am

There is a standard mileage charge to cover the fuel costs from the driver's home and back again, plus the cost of any parking charges.






