Our June Parish Hall meeting took place on a beautiful hot, summer evening, was well attended and, surprisingly, we all managed to remember that we were starting at 7.30pm now rather

than 8pm! We knew that there was a lot to talk about regarding the doctor's surgery so we got through the normal business as quickly as possible.

Treasurer's report Sarah had only just got back from holiday but reported that the rent from the surgery was now being paid monthly and the Hall accounts were looking reasonably healthy.

Electrical Report Chairman Jan then updated us regarding the electrical problems that had been highlighted in the recent Electrical Installation Condition report, linked to the Hall's insurance. This

has meant a lot of work and hassle for Jan, but most of these have now been dealt with. One problem that needed further investigation was due to be sorted out later that week. However, the need to interrupt the electricity supply for these to be fixed meant that the supply to the surgery was also interrupted and although the electricians went out of their way to reduce the problem by starting work at 5.30am, it did highlight the need for the surgery to have a separate supply.

Jan also reported that the main hall had been repainted but she felt that we should hold off on any further work until we know how much the electrical work is going to cost.

Severndipity Ken Boulton reported that the bar takings are picking up and that the bar used by parents on a Friday evening during Junior Cricket has been a real boost. There are also several bookings for parties in the near future. However, problems again arose with under-age drinking and difficult behaviour at an 18th birthday party and the bar had to be closed at 10pm. It was therefore suggested that we should turn down future bookings for parties for under 25s unless the hosts are willing to pay for private security staff. It's a knotty problem and one that I'm sure will come up for discussion again in the future.

Fundraising The next fundraising event is the Craft Fair on 9th July and schedules will soon be out for the Flower and Produce Show on 3rd September. There were 37 diners at the June Nosh and Natter and I can certainly vouch for the excellent quality of the lasagne, garlic bread and Eton Mess – it was much enjoyed.

On Sat 9th September there will be the first of some new Tribute Nights, this one being a Rod Stewart Tribute Night.

Doctors Surgery Gen Riley reported that, at last, she and Mike Edginton had been able to meet face to face with repre-

sentatives from NHS Property Services and NHS Gloucestershire Primary Care Contracting. She felt that it was a productive meeting and, as well as setting the record straight regarding past problems with the lease, they were able to negotiate the core items regarding the new lease. Gen circulated her notes from the meeting and the Committee were in agreement with the terms of the lease that had been discussed, although there were a few sums and checks that needed to be done before the Heads of Terms can be approved. However, the building will need a separate electricity supply but as the presence of a doctor's surgery in the parish is a benefit to many people in both Westbury and Newnham, it was agreed that we should see if funds can be sourced to help with the costs involved. Additional good news is that NHS Gloucestershire have expressed their desire to maintain services at Westbury for the longer term.

Any Other Business Max Skipsey reported that the Rugby Sevens tournament which was scheduled for July 22nd has been cancelled and Mike Edginton is going to tackle the problem of the pot holes in the Hall car park. Clive Tempest has obtained a quote for roof repairs but it was agreed that the electrical works need to be finished and paid for first.

So, although the bar was not open, we went home feeling rather more positive about the Hall and the doctor's surgery than when we arrived.

In time it is expected that all these parishes will become one benefice. It will be some two and three quarter years since the Reverend Steve Taylor retired and the PCC welcome Reverend David to our community. Simon Phelps

Parish Council

t our June meeting, we were able to move swiftly on to public comments after the usual formalities. A request for some Parish Council funding towards the costs of a defibrillator for the Elton area was requested and will be considered and Gen Riley came to update us on the situation regarding the Doctors' surgery. Progress has now been made regarding the terms of the lease and NHS Gloucestershire seem keen to maintain services in Westbury for the longer term. However, the Parish Hall will have incurred considerable expense and requested some assistance from the Parish Council towards this cost. This too will be considered, although Parish Council funds are rather low at present due to the considerable costs of the burial ground extension and the drainage of the school playing field.

Planning

Some concerns were raised regarding an application for change of use and conversion of a garage to a holiday let/annexe at Thistlemoor in Church Lane as it was felt that the site was too small and there was no increase in parking space. There were no objections to an application for change of use from holiday let to residential dwelling at the Lower White House in New Road or the erection of an agricultural building for the storage of a specialist agricultural vehicle at the Paddocks in Goose Lane. We agreed that lawful commencement of work at Severndale in Strand Lane took place before planning permission expired and there were no objections to the erection of a two storey rear extension with associated works and demolition of the conservatory at Elton Nurseries. Fiona then let us know that an earlier application for work at The Cottage, Jordan Hill has been granted.

Finance

The bill for £39,000 for fencing for the

burial ground and school playing field has to be paid by the end of July but the Public Works Loan Board loan has taken rather longer than expected to come through so funds are rather tight at present.

Highways

Our Chairman Simon Phelps had a very useful meeting with Andrew Middlecote from Highways, together with our County Councillor Philip Robinson and Adrian Brown, the Highways manager for our area, and they were able to go through all the issues with the parish's roads. On the 'to do' list are the clearance of the footways and pavements through the village, discussion with the Internal Drainage Board regarding flooding in Goose Lane, and with Severn Trent about problems in Ampney Lane and the investigation of possible pipe blockages and flooding at Adsett and near the Parish Hall. Some good news is that Hunt Hill is on the list for re-dressing in the next financial year but there will be some patching of pot holes in the meantime. There will also be further investigation regarding flooding at Blue Boys and Acres Corner. New signs will be put up at Jordan Hill railway bridge and Highways have offered to clear the growth on the bridge while the line is closed, but Network Rail have said "No". The Parish Council has been pressing for a 40mph buffer zone either side of the 30mph limit through the village in order to make Jordan Hill, Wintles Hill and the Six Bells crossroads safer and have some support from the Police Road Safety Officer and strong support from Forest of Dean Road Safety Group. However Highways raise problems with the high cost of implementing additional speed limits in order to comply with legislation.

Highways have started to clear the tall vegetation from the junctions and will be starting to cut all the verges very soon.

Simon had already been in touch with Severn Trent about the noisy manhole covers in the village and had that day asked them to make it a top priority, as the noise must be really irritating to those living nearby.

Burial Ground Extension

The fencing work has now been completed as per the plans but no agreement has yet been reached with the County Council regarding the rent.

Climate Change

I reported on the recent Forest Climate Network meeting at which a website called The Great Collaboration, which has been set up by a partnership based in Herefordshire, was highly recommended. The aim of the site is "to provide timely, relevant, accurate data to inform local environmental policy" and it was suggested that a link be placed on each Parish Council website.

Around the Parish

Mike Townsend has done the repair work on the wetpour at the play area and a working party is to be arranged so that it can be given a good sweep. The seats and picnic table need a bit of TLC and enquiries will be made as to whether this can be done under the Fair Shares or Community Payback schemes. Severn Trent have again been asked to repair the manhole cover in the play area.

A couple of footpaths will have to be closed while work is being done on the nearby railway line and quotes are being obtained for work on some of the parish's bus shelters.

The next meeting is on Monday 17th July at 7pm. *Di Landon*

I think we were all sad to see Westbury Court Care Home close and it has now been cleared out ready to be put on the market. All the furniture has been taken away, having mainly been smashed flat in

order to best use the capacity of the skips. One of the contractors present said that some of the items were almost new and commented that, with so many furniture recycling projects around, and in these days

days of austerity, he would have thought that the furniture

could have been recycled. If Gloucestershire County Council is as short of funds as we're told, many Council Tax payers might think that they should make better use of their assets.

Closed Churchyard

We had a beautiful, sunny morning and plenty of helpers for our June working party in the closed churchyard. One crew worked on clearing a space all



along the c h u r c h wall on the south s i d e, while another crew turned all the com-

post in the bins and removed the nettles that prevented people from getting anywhere near the listed 'tea caddy' tombs. It was warm work and we really earned our much appreciated cuppa and cake!

Our next session will be on the usual second Saturday of the month, Sat 8th July, but the August working party will be on the 3rd Saturday of the month (19th) as there is a wedding at the Church on 12th. All volunteers are very welcome.

Road Closures

Elton Lane will be closed from 11th - 13th July from Emmings Farm to The Tump House for a distance of approximately 10 metres for Severn Trent pipe works. Upper Rodley Road will be closed on 14th July between 08:00 and 17:00 from Hill Side Farm to Rodley Court for approximately 512 metres for Gigaclear works. The A40 in Huntley village will be closed for full overnight closures for road resurfacing works from Monday 17 July to Thursday 27 July 2023.

Footpath Closures

The footpath between Broken Cross and Ley will be closed from $10\text{th} - 14^{\text{th}}$ July and footpath EWS 18 between Ley Court Wood and Green Farm will be closed from 10th July 2023 to 28th July. These closures are to safeguard the public while works to upgrade the level crossing are undertaken.

Weather Report for May

The warmest day was the 18th when the temperature reached 21c and the warmest nights were between 4th and 6th when it was 10°C. The coldest night was 15th/16th when the temperature fell to 2°C and the days of 6th and 8th did not get warmer than 14°C. The wettest day was 9th when there was 14.5mm of rain and some thunder. There were 10 days with rain during the month with a total rainfall of 48.5mm. Warm and Well



A lthough next winter may seem far away, it will be with us before we know it. The Forest of Dean District Council's Warm and Well scheme provides help and support to bring more people out of fuel poverty, make homes healthier for those living in the district's hardest to heat properties, and cut carbon emissions by taking action to reduce energy consumption. The service also administers grant funding for those who need it.

Councillor Chris McFarling, Cabinet Member for Climate Emergency at Forest of Dean District Council, said: "With a range of funding options available we would encourage homeowners, tenants and landlords to speak to one of Warm and Well's expert advisers and see what measures they could be eligible for and start getting homes ready now."

Last year the service also unlocked £319,000 worth of grant funding to make homes warmer and more energy efficient, contributing towards 49 energy-saving improvements - including the fitting of new boilers, heaters, insulation and renewable energy measures - being made. In most cases the home energy improvements are fully funded.
