profitable and it was agreed that the problem of the wastage from serving draft beer for small numbers will need to be addressed. A new treasurer will also be needed as Val will not be continuing after the next AGM.

## Fundraising

Tickets for the Kebabaret were selling well and helpers had been enlisted. The recent Jumble Sale had made a profit of $£ 440$ and another is planned for next February. We can now look forward to our Pre-Xmas Bash on Saturday November $25^{\text {th }}$. This was a great success last year and a chance to get an early start on Christmas celebrations. ## Parish Council

The October Parish Council meeting got off to a slow start as there was an electrical problem at the Hall which meant that the lounge was in darkness! However, after a bit of attention, the lights came on, although we did have a few more dark moments as the evening progressed.
After the minutes of the last meeting had been agreed we moved on to public comment. This month, the matter raised concerned the rules regarding graves and boundary markers in the burial ground.
Planning Another matter raised by a member of the public was regarding a retrospective planning application for a barn conversion in Adsett Lane, following some concerns that the development was not compliant with the original permission granted. It was agreed that we should make a site visit to the property the following weekend, which we did and agreed to support the application.
Our clerk, Fiona, then updated us on decisions made on earlier applications for glamping pods at Elton and extensions at Chapel House at Broadoak, both of which had been granted.
Finance The financial statements were agreed. Contractors have been given the go ahead to carry out the work needed on several of the bus shelters in the parish. The grass cutting contracts run out at the end of the year and Fiona will be asking for tenders.
Highways Hunt Hill still awaits repairs but the overgrown footway through the village has been cleared. The drains between Rodley Court and Bluboys have been jetted and while this was being done, it was found that a telephone pole had been put right through the middle of the drain.
Play Area Mike Townsend reported that there are areas of the wetpour which need
repair and he is in contact with Severn Trent regarding the broken manhole cover.
Burial Ground and School Playing
Field Fiona has heard nothing more from the solicitors regarding the lease of the playing field so she will chase this up. Footpaths There are two or three new footpath problems, including one near Elton which will be reported to the Public Rights of Way (PRoW) team. Mike Townsend will also again raise the issue of a footpath at Hartland Hill which has been blocked for a long time with the PRoW team making no progress with getting it open again.
Climate Change A project is underway in the Forest of Dean to look at ways to make communities more resilient to the hotter and drier summers and heavier winter rainfall that we are likely to experience in the future. Attention is mainly focused on the four Forest towns, but parish councils are also involved and technical support is available.
Doctors Surgery Westbury Parish Hall have asked if the Parish Council can help financially with the high cost of installing a separate electricity supply to the surgery, which is required as part of the lease agreement. It was agreed that some financial assistance can be given to the Hall in the next financial year but it was agreed that Newnham Parish Council should also be invited to contribute.

## Other matters A

 new solar powered community speedwatch camera has now been installed in Westbury which has automatic number plate recogni- tion, so hopefully this will help to slow traffic through the village. It is similar to the one installed in Minsterworth, so see p5 for more details.

Mike Townsend reported problems with the bus service in Northwood Green as the bus is often late and on one occasion recently did not arrive at all. This has been reported and it is understood that Newent Dial-a-ride will be taking over this route to Gloucester next year.

## Road Closure

Rodley Road will be closed from 13th November 2023 until 15th November 2023 from its junction with the A48 to its junction with Strand Lane for a total distance of approximately 100 metres. This is for remedial repair works to the carriageway.

## Closed Churchyard

We had a very successful and wellsupported working party in the churchyard in October. We were able to tidy up the roadside hedge and get rid of a lot of the ever-returning nettles, elder and ivy.
We also had a bit of drama when some bags of rubbish, that had been dumped over the churchyard wall opposite the Lyon, were investigated. Inside one of them was found a large knife and a gun! A swift call to the police brought an armed response unit, who removed the bags, and we carried on with our weeding.
The grass has been growing rampantly and this causes a problem when you are trying to encourage wildflowers as all the cuttings need to be removed so that soil nutrients are reduced and the growth of coarse grasses is curbed. We have tried sowing yellow rattle, which is semiparasitic and dampens the vigour of the grass, but so far this has not been very successful. Perhaps next year! The advice from the experts at Caring for

God's Acre is that we should 'manage our expectations'. They point out that most people think of wildflower areas as a dazzle of colour from plants such as poppies and cornflowers, which are often grown from imported seeds, rather than the subtle tapestry of colour produced by our native flowers.
Our next session, weather permitting, will be on Saturday $11^{\text {th }}$ November between 10 am and 1 pm . All are very welcome and many thanks to our many regular helpers.

## Minsterworth Community Speedwatch Camera

Following a bid to Gloucestershire Community Speedwatch Fund, an initiative jointly run by the County Council and the Police, Minsterworth Parish Council now has a community monitored speed camera called Autospeedwatch. Located on the A48, the camera became fully functional in June 2023.
Although not continuously monitoring traffic passing through the village, it has been set up to take a photo when vehicles pass, travelling over the speed limit. The data from the camera is kept secure and confidential, and operated under the terms of a Service Level Agreement with the Police. It is positioned so that it does not take photos of the occupants of any vehicle, only its registration plate.
Information about speeding vehicles, and any recorded as not having Tax and/or MOT, is now being sent on to the Police on a weekly basis, and as a result the Police will be contacting the vehicles owners.
It is hoped that the level of anti-social driving through Minsterworth will reduce as the number of people contacted by the Police increases.
So, if you are travelling through Minsterworth - please smile for our camera!

## Allan Wintle 1932-2023

Westbury Church was filled with Allan's family and friends for the celebration of his long and fulfilling life. Allan was a much loved husband, father, 'Grampy', great grandfather and brother, and his family paid tribute to him with wonderfully warm words and poems.
Allan was born at Lydney Hospital and spent a happy childhood at Crookham Farm in Blakeney with his grandmother, parents and siblings. His parents worked a milk round and were also busy with contract farming and Allan helped out on the farm as soon as he was old enough.
His family summarised his life within three titles- 'life', 'love and 'passion'. 'Life' for Allan was definitely farming, and this was what brought him to Rodley in his early working years, where he worked at the family's Hillside Farm, Gravel Farm and Yew Tree Farm. He met Ruby at a dance in Lydney Town Hall and in 1961 they married and settled in their self-built Cleeve Bungalow, before moving to Yew Tree Farm in 1967.
Milking cows was his daily constant until the late 1970s, when he switched to sheep, and the 'full on' nature of farming meant that holidays were rare. Ruby was always by his side, supporting him throughout their 62 years together.
The 'love' in his life was his family, and his children described with fondness and gratitude the wonderful, loving upbringing that he gave to them all. In 1988, his first grandchild, Laura, arrived, since followed by six grandsons and now two great grandsons. Allan and Ruby have been a constant in all the grandchildren's lives and gave so much time to them. Allan adored nothing more than having a baby on his lap to cwtch and he also had a wealth of farming knowledge to share with them .

The 'passion' in Allan's life was undoubtedly his love of horses. Before he became a family man, he rode both under National Hunt rules and point-to-point locally and while the arrival of his family led to his decision to hang up his boots, there is hardly a horse-related discipline that Allan had not tried. Over his son Adrian's 20 year riding career, Allan rarely missed a meeting and he was also a regular at Ascot Horse Sales. Ruby used to joke that if ever Allan were unable to attend, the sales would be unlikely to go ahead without him. A bargain that became a winner was the very best result in Allan's eyes.
Two very special winners for him were granddaughter Laura's point to point win in 2009 and the family-owned Stay out of Court's win at Hereford Racecourse in 2019.

So, Allan had a hugely fulfilling life packed with hard work and lots of patience, and was a "gentleman" in the true sense of the word. His kindness, helpfulness and selflessness was what brought a church full of people together to say their farewells and celebrate his life.
