

As we assembled for the November meeting, we thought that there might not be enough of us for a quorum, but we were soon up to ten so we were able to proceed.

Since our previous meeting, BT have supplied a booster to help solve the Wifi problems and are sending another one, as the first one had not quite done the trick. There is still some uncertainty about the maximum number of people allowed in the Hall under the Fire Regulations and some clarification of this will be sought.

#### Utilities

Jan D'Ambrogio has now ended the contract with Bionic and can negotiate directly with EDF in future. There is still no smart meter but this will now be left until after the separate electricity supply for the doctor's surgery has been installed. Jan is hopeful that there will be a reduction in the gas costs from this month. There is still no heating in the changing rooms, but the showers are now working and the heating should be fixed very soon. The electrical jobs are being worked through and Mike Edginton has boxed in the unsightly cables in the corner of the Hall.

## Treasurer's Report

Sarah Mitten was unable to attend but had circulated copies of the accounts. Jan reported that the Kebabaret had made an excellent profit and it was agreed that a letter of thanks should be sent to Katie Hyett for staging this event.

**Projects** Unfortunately, the Hall was unable to purchase the chairs for the

lounge as discussed at our last meeting. **Severndipity (Bar committee)** 

Gen Riley reported on the Severndipity Committee's meeting the previous evening. They have decided the bar will no longer be opened on Tuesday evenings and the general feeling at the meeting had been that user groups should be encouraged to organise events that would produce more profitable bar takes.

The Severndipity accounts had been circulated and there were some concerns as to whether it was necessary to hold such a wide range of stock, and the waste involved when serving draught beers and ciders. This led to considerable discussion as to a) whether reducing the range of stock would deter booking for events such as weddings b) the effect of reducing or discontinuing the stocking of draught beers and ciders and c) the possibility of finding another less wasteful line system. Gen Riley is looking into the pros and cons of the latter solution.

Gen explained that the lack of bars serving large numbers is a contributory factor to the wastage and the constantly changing prices also cause problems. However, the Severndipity Committee is well aware of the concerns and it was agreed that the present situation is not sustainable. Hall committee members were invited to the next Severndipity meeting to discuss these concerns and it was agreed to reevaluate the situation in the New Year. Jan thanked Gen for all her work on this.

Vespa Scooter Rally This will take place at the Hall next summer and it is hoped that this will provide one of the really good bar takes that the Hall so badly needs

#### **Fundraising**

The Kebabaret had been a huge success, and a lot of very positive feedback had been received. Jan asked committee members to send in ideas or photos for the Hall's entry in the Christmas Tree Festival at the church

## Drs surgery

Mike Edginton reported that he had met with a representative from Western Power on site, to discuss the installation of a separate electricity supply for the surgery. Di Landon reported that the Parish Council had agreed to make some contribution towards this cost and that Newnham Parish Council will also be asked to contribute.

#### Any other business

Helen Cracknell suggested that we start planning next year's Summer Show and Jan reminded us of the need for a new sign board. Di Landon reported that the Gloucestershire Rural Community Council is undertaking a Housing Needs Survey for Westbury Parish and questionnaires will be sent out to every household. As part of this process, the Parish Council has been invited to discuss grant assistance for voluntary organisations operating in our parish, and therefore we need to hear about any projects that are being considered that may qualify for this.

# **Parish Council**

Te had our full quota of parish councillors at the November meeting, and were joined by the County Public Rights of Way (PRoW) officer, Jeff Wheeler, who had come to discuss . . . . . Footpaths With 63 miles of footpaths in our parish, we are in frequent contact with him so it was good to meet him in person. The main issues that we wanted to discuss were a blocked footpath, and reports of plot holders in Ley Park Woods intimidating walkers. Some waymarker posts have also been removed. Jeff advised that these incidents need to be reported to his team online to ensure that action is taken.

Public Comment The recent closure for two days of Rodley Road, between the Parish Hall and Strand Lane, has been of disputed value. Gigaclear had dug a trench (for the third time) and even the men on site did not see why it was being done. This also raised the issue of why the 6" pipes under the road, which are there to drain the water towards the river, have not been replaced by 10" pipes

which would be more effective and help to prevent the road flooding. The Parish Council has been asking Highways to do this for some time but Chairman Simon Phelps agreed to contact them again.

Planning Objections were raised to an application for a residential development of one detached dwelling on Wintles Hill on the grounds that it would be a new build on a greenfield site and outside the settlement boundary, and there were also concerns about the safety of access on to the A48. Fiona updated us on an earlier application for conversion of an agricultural building to a dwelling at Cothill Farm which had been refused.

Finance The financial statements and accounts for payment were agreed. Owing to new National Association of Local Councils (NALC) pay scales and a recent job evaluation, it was agreed to increase the salary of our clerk, Fiona Wallbank. While this may be the statutory reason, it is also because we wouldn't ever want to have to manage without her!

Fiona has drafted the budget for next year. The grass cutting contracts are up for renewal and it was agreed that we need to reassess the grass cutting map for the closed churchyard. The burial ground extension will also now need mowing.

Highways There is a huge pothole near Cowleys Elm Farm in Rodley. As reports of Highway problems are dealt with online now, it is possible to Google 'Fix My Street' which will take you to a website where you give the postcode and describe the problem. If it is a pothole and you are able to upload a photo and, if possible, stick a tape measure in the hole to show how deep it is, it does seem to get the problem dealt with a bit faster — and presumably the more often it is reported the better.

The work done by Severn Trent in Ampney Lane went over the time predicted and the site was left in a mess, so Mike Townsend has emailed the Managing Director. The drains in Rodley are to be tackled next year.

#### **Burial Ground extension**

The lease of the new school playing field has still not been agreed and so Fiona will chase up the County Council and the solicitors about this, and will send GCC an invoice, as the rent was due in September. Following the issue regarding graves and boundary markers that was raised at last month's meeting, it was agreed that in future a form regarding burials should be agreed with the undertaker and the family before the burial.

Play Area The recent annual play area inspection conducted by the Play Inspection Company had suggested that the balancing beam be removed, as the wood is rotting. The wetpour is also in need of some repairs and the cost of this has been allowed for in next year's budget.

Other matters Two years ago, the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust asked the Parish Council to take on the maintenance of Poulton Wood, to which we agreed. However, they have now decided to keep this area and will continue to maintain it. As new housing at Longhope has an impact on flooding in Blaisdon and Westbury, it was considered that we suggest to the Forest of Dean District Council that Westbury Parish Council should be consulted about a current application to build 45 new houses in Longhope and about similar applications in future.

Gloucestershire Rural Community Council has been asked to conduct a Housing Needs Survey in Westbury next year and the Affordable Housing Manager will be coming to talk to us about this at the January meeting.

Our next meeting is on Monday 18<sup>th</sup> December at 7pm at the Parish Hall.


