

Westbury's Got Talent



A memorable evening was had by all at the Parish Hall at the end of term, as the staff and families of students of Westbury CE Primary gathered for the bi-annual celebration of Westbury's Got Talent, the 8th the school has held. The event, hosted by The Friends of Westbury School, gave us all an evening of wonderful and varied talent.

The evening began with Helen Cracknell introducing the evening's judges - past Westbury teacher Sian Landon, chair of Westbury Players Mark Landon and Westbury Youth Project leader Nicola Atkinson. It was great to have Nicola judging, as having been the chair of Friends a number of years ago, it is her we have to thank for establishing this fixture onto the school's calendar in 2009 .

The evening's acts were excellently introduced by the show's comperes, Barney,

Lewys, Wilf and Reuben, who maintained the smooth running of the evening alongside the ever-talented team of Mrs Roseblade backstage, Claire McCartney on sound and Matt Fransham on lights. The brave contestant who opened the show was Poppy, who gave a super rendition of George Ezra's 'Gold Rush Kid'. She sang with strength and carried off a great double denim look too. Having set the bar high, it was up to Heidi and Adam to continue the show. Being older members of the school, they were able to use this to their advantage to perform 'The Teacher Act'. The staff of the school sat nervously as they waited for Heidi and Adam's observations of them, which they executed brilliantly, whether it was Mrs Sim and her designer bags, Mrs 'Forest' Green or Miss Wills continuously losing her keys! Finally - in the first act of the night , Hattie, one of the younger per-

Our May Parish Hall meeting was well attended and everyone is settling in to their allotted roles. Ken Boulton is working on the problems with reading the water meters and has been negotiating a new contract with Biffa which could save around £30 per month, so this was agreed.

Treasurer's report Sarah Mitten reported that it had been a better month financially with a few more bookings and some profitable fundraising. Our solicitor's advice will be sought regarding whether the doctor's surgery building should now be added to the Hall's accounts as an asset. Sarah has checked with our insurers following concerns being raised about the possible risks involved in changing the signs on the roadside display board, and she has been assured that volunteers are covered in the same way as employees.

Sub-Committees We now have four sub-committees — administration, utilities, maintenance and fundraising. We also have new committee members and it was suggested that information about the Hall and its workings should be made available to them so that they feel more able to partake in discussions at meetings. Sarah and Gen Riley will arrange this.

Utilities The Hall's Wifi is very poor and so a quote is to be obtained for wifi boosters which will be hard wired in to the walls. Ken Boulton updated us on the lower price rates under the new electricity contract, which starts in August.

Maintenance Chair Sally Godwin thanked the maintenance committee for cutting the grass verge near the Hall gates, which has much improved the visibility as you exit the Hall car park. Mike Edginton and Brian Wyman had been busy cleaning the gutters and the flat roof and will have a look at a couple of other issues that were raised. Mike wished to thank Rich Eeles for all the work that he does to keep the playing field in such good condition.

Fundraising The fundraising committee had met earlier in the month and Tiff Cairns circulated a list of the planned activities for the year. Tiff and Sarah are also looking at ways to set up Gift Aid for donations. Committee members were asked to make sure that they plug Hall events with their user groups.

Severndipity (Bar) Severndipity had held their AGM but still have two vacancies on the committee. There was some discussion as to whether soft drinks at weddings should be provided by caterers or sold by the bar and the two treasurers will discuss this further. Bar volunteers were requested for the forthcoming scooter rally and, in future, training will be arranged so that volunteers are ready to help at big events such as this.

Other matters An incident of some dangerous speeding round the car park had been reported to the PCSO. Gen Riley was due to meet with NHS Gloucestershire later that week regarding the lease of the doctor's surgery.

The next meeting is on Tuesday 11th June at 7.30pm.

So we wanted to take this opportunity to thank both him, Jim Brass and all the other quizmasters, for the work they have done to provide so many entertaining and informative evenings at the Parish Hall. The quizzes have been a regular part of the Hall's programme of events for many, many years and have been much enjoyed as well as providing an income for the Hall. We are hoping that the Hall can continue to be a venue for quizzes in the future, so more details on that in next month's WoSP.

Parish Council

May is the month when the Parish Council holds an Annual Parish Meeting and an Annual Council Meeting, which understandably leads to some confusion. To clarify, the Annual Parish Meeting is largely to keep parishioners up to date with what has been happening with local government and public services over the previous year, whereas the Annual Council Meeting is to elect the Chair and Vice Chair and to appoint councillors to the various roles within the Council.

Unfortunately, our County Councillor, Philip Robinson was unable to attend and there were no members of the public present, but after accepting last year's minutes, the Annual Parish Meeting heard from PCSO Tracy Martin, who went through last year's crime figures for

Westbury. We much appreciated her presence, as for the last few years the police have not sent a representative and she had attended even though it had been her day off.

There had been a small increase in the number of road accidents involving injuries but traffic offences were down and accidents involving only vehicle damage were the same as the previous year. We know that the main accident spots are Elton Corner, Jordans Hill Bridge and Chaxhill and so we asked if she could let us know where in the parish the accidents occurred, so that we have figures which may support our request for changes to the speed limit at Jordans Hill. There was one instance of house burglary and one car stolen, which was the same as last year, and the only drug offence was one for possession of cannabis. There were eight instances of anti-social behaviour. There had been a recent incident when two cars were seen racing around the Parish Hall car park and this was reported to PCSO Martin and she will bear this in mind when on her rounds.

Our Chairman, Simon Phelps, had circulated his annual report in which he alluded to the frustrations over several issues affecting the parish which have not been resolved. Top of the list is the hold up with the leasehold agreement for the School Field extension, but the state of the roads, the overflowing sewers and improving the visibility on the approach to Jordan Hill Bridge are also proving hard to resolve. However, the churchyard is becoming a better habitat for wildflowers and wildlife partly thanks to the Churchyard Working Group. Simon went on to thank our County Councillor, Philip Robinson, and his fellow councillors for their support and expressed all our thanks to our Parish Clerk, Fiona Wallbank.

We then moved on to the Annual Council Meeting at which Simon Phelps was

unanimously re-elected as Chairman and Richard Hewlett was elected as Vice-Chairman. Richard Hewlett also agreed to continue as Snow and Flood Warden, Debbie Hill will continue to be responsible for the Emergency Plan and I will carry on as Parish Council representative on the Parish Hall committee.

Planning There were no planning applications to be considered (which was very unusual) so we moved on to

Financial Matters The monthly accounts were agreed but the signing of the annual accounts had to be deferred until next month as our usual auditor is unwell and alternative arrangements have had to be made. It was agreed that dedicated Parish Council email addresses should be arranged for parish councillors rather than them using their personal email addresses for Parish Council business and Fiona is setting this up. We have had a couple of incidents of spam emails being sent out and it is likely to soon become compulsory for Parish Councils to use a gov.uk domain.

Highways Chairman Simon Phelps and Richard Hewlett had accompanied Andrew Middlecote and a colleague from Gloucestershire Highways on a tour around the parish's trouble spots (all 21 of them!) As well as the general poor state of the roads, especially at Hunt Hill, Frowens Lane and Cowleys Elm, where there is also a massive pot hole, they looked at several blocked drains, and areas where there is subsidence or which are prone to flooding. So Highways are now fully aware of all the issues, but this clearly does not mean that they will be quickly fixed – as Westbury is far from alone in having problems on this scale. Highways Departments are obviously getting stick from everyone, and they pointed out that problems such as the limited budget, and the fact that it takes 4 months to get a 'Road Closure' notice

issued, do not help them get through the vast amount of work that is needed. Simon has written to Mark Harper about the visibility issue at Jordan Hill railway bridge. More care will have to be taken when driving along the lanes this summer, as the verges will only be cut once and, judging by the height of the vegetation already, it will be very difficult to see what's coming round the bends.

Burial Ground and School Playing Field There has been no response from the County Council regarding the lease and the unpaid rent, in spite of our Clerk, Fiona, chasing this on a regular basis. She has now completed the incredibly complex form applying for change of use that they have suddenly demanded. We are still awaiting a letter of support from the school governors, which is also required, but that seems to be taking a while.

Play Area This is in need of a good spring clean so Mike Townsend will ask if the Community Payback team would be willing to do this for us as they made a very good job of it last time.

Footpaths Mike Townsend reported that there are a couple of fallen trees blocking footpaths in Ley Park and that there has been a problem on footpath EWS 5.

Climate Change The Forest Climate Network is keen for every Parish Council to do as much as possible to encourage residents to reduce their carbon emissions, protect their local environment from the effects of climate change and to encourage biodiversity. However, they also suggest that members of the community should be encouraged to play a part, or take a lead in this, so we would be very pleased to hear from anyone who is willing to help with any projects of this sort. The next phase of the Severn Estuary Resilience Program (SERP) starts soon and preparation is due to commence from **Monday 3 June**, with the main work taking place **whilst the railway is temporarily closed** between Severn Tunnel Junction and Gloucester from Monday 22 July to Saturday 10 August. Be Ready for the General Election

It is important that those who want to vote in the general election make sure they are registered and that they have an accepted form of photo ID for voting in person in a polling station.

If anyone is unable to go to a polling station on Thursday 4 July they can apply to vote by post or even appoint a proxy - a person you trust to vote on your behalf. Remember that before you can apply for a postal vote or appoint a proxy you must be registered to vote.
